Definition

A violator is in **Significant Non-Compliance (SNC)** if the violation(s) meets any of the following criteria:

- exceeds SNC thresholds established by a corresponding federal program;
- has caused actual, or has the potential to cause adverse impact to public health or the environment;
- represents willful, chronic or recalcitrant behavior;
- substantially deviates from the terms of a permit, order, settlement agreement, or from statutory or regulatory requirements; or
- is not corrected within 60 days following the issuance of a Notice of Violation, Site Complaint or Inspection Report by the Department.

* These are the numbers WAS reported; we assume they are MDE-only. Numbers of third-party inspections are not reported quarterly.

[1] The private third-party inspectors perform basic compliance inspections for lead hazard reductions. They are making a determination of compliance/non-compliance with mandated lead dust test standards (in most cases) or lead hazard treatment completion. The MDE oversight inspections are conducted to verify the accuracy and work quality of the third party inspectors. Apart from these oversight inspections, MDE LPPP staff conduct a variety of investigations that may include dust tests and visual inspections, but third party inspectors perform essentially all basic compliance testing.

[2] Some MDE oversight inspections find that deteriorated paint conditions exist for a unit that passed a visual inspection. In those cases, the inspection certification is invalidated and the inspector is cited. Initial penalties for these citations can range from \$500 to \$1,000. For repeat failures, fines will escalate and inspectors may lose their certifications permanently.
