Opening Remarks:

- The meeting was called to order by Mark Stewart, facilitator, at 10 a.m.
- Mark provided updates on MDE's climate team staffing and building decarbonization initiatives, including the new collective heat pump goal set by a coalition of 9 states.
- Co-chair Kim Coble noted that there are more than 3,300 bills before the General Assembly this session, with around half related to climate.

Review of Climate Plan Investments:

- The climate plan estimates \$16-18 billion is needed in total investment this decade to meet Maryland's 2030 emissions reduction goal. This includes both public and private funding sources leveraging each other.
- The plan calls for an additional \$1 billion per year in state funding to help drive private investment and target priority projects. This funding need is based on analysis of investment gaps, comparisons to other leading states, and typical public-private investment leverage ratios.
- Priority investment areas highlighted in the plan include:
 - Home energy efficiency and electrification
 - Commercial, institutional, and multifamily building upgrades

- Electric vehicle rebates and charging infrastructure
- o Industry, infrastructure, and nature-based solutions
- Workforce development
- Consumer education and outreach

MWG Member Discussion:

- Key points raised:
 - Investments should consider resilience and avoid exacerbating environmental justice issues
 - Electric grid upgrades are needed to enable building electrification
 - Incentives should prepare homes for smart, demand-responsive operations
 - A framework is needed to evaluate/prioritize spending based on emissions, costs, community impacts, and timeline
 - Maximize use of current federal incentives before they potentially expire
 - Analyze potential new state funding mechanisms (cap & invest, fees, etc.)
 - Comprehensively address vehicle miles traveled (VMT), not just vehicle electrification
